OTI MABUSE:

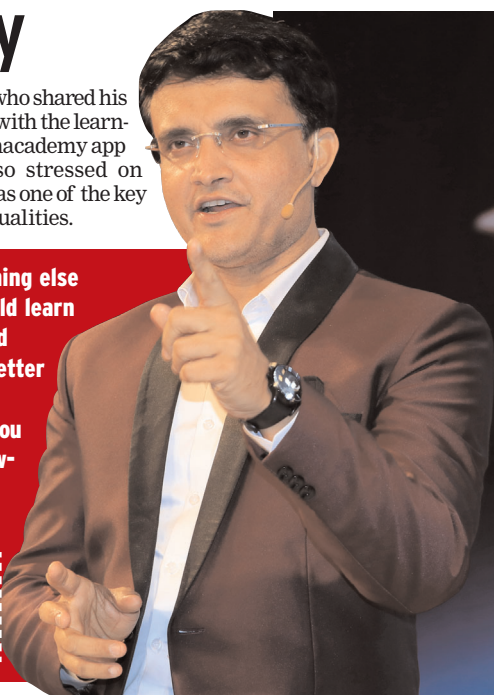

Trump calls G7 outdated, wants India, others to join the group

US President Donald Trump has postponed the "outdated" Group of Seven summit that he planned to hold in June at the White House, seeking inclusion of India and some other countries to the grouping of world's top economies. Trump said he is "postponing it until September" and plans to invite Russia, South Korea, Australia and India. "I don't feel that as a G7, it properly represents what's going on in the world. It's a very outdated group of countries," he added.

VIEWPOINT

➤ G7 is a forum of the seven countries with the world's largest and most advanced economies—France, Germany, Italy, Japan, US, UK and Canada. Heads of States of these countries meet annually on international, economic and monetary issues. ➤ The US holds the presidency of the G7 this year. ➤ During the summit, G7 president normally invites Heads of States of one or two countries to attend the meeting as a special invitee. ➤ Last year, French President Emmanuel Macron had invited PM Narendra Modi to the G7 Summit.

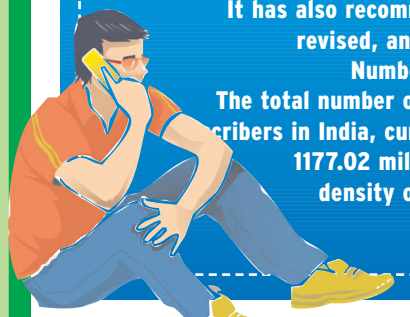
10-DIGIT NUMBERS TO CONTINUE: TRAI

The Telecom regulatory authority of India (TRAI) has refuted claims of shifting to an 11-digit mobile numbering plan, saying that it has only suggested prefixing '0', when mobile numbers are called from landlines. Introduction of a dialling prefix for a particular type of call "is not akin to increasing the number of digits in the telephone number", it stated.

➤ In its report, TRAI said, the migration to a unified or single numbering scheme for fixed line and mobile services is not required for now; sufficient numbering space can be created by various methods, including prefixing '0' for all fixed to mobile calls

It has also recommended an early, revised, and a new National Numbering Plan (NNP). The total number of telephone subscribers in India, currently stands at 1177.02 million, with a tele-density of 87.45% at the end of Jan 2020



Manipur youth creates 'Iron Man' replica out of electronic waste

Enthralled by Hollywood super hero movies, a 20-year-old youth from Manipur has created a replica of Marvel's iconic character, Iron Man, out of electronic waste. Ningombam Prem, who hails from Heirok Part-2 village in Thoubal district, said that he created the suit using discarded scrap materials, emergency lamps, electronic toys, syringes, speaker frames and even IV-fluid tubes. "I always wanted to create a robot since my childhood days. But the craze for Iron Man costume started around 2015," he said. Prem had earlier created demo model of other robotic items, such as mechanism of producing web from the hand like that of Spiderman.

GOOGLE LAUNCHES NEW PROGRAMME TO STOP COVID-19 SCAMMERS

Google has launched a new programme called Scam Spotter to spot and stop scammers who are exploiting the Covid-19 pandemic with alarming speed, and taking advantage of fear and uncertainty

The programme simplifies expert's advice with three rules, when you receive a suspicious phone call or message to figure out if it's a scam. The three rules are: "Slow it down, spot check and stop! Don't send."

TECH BUZZ

- According to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC), people reported \$1.9 billion 'lost to scams' in 2019.
- Every minute, more than \$3,600 disappeared from wallets and bank accounts, in response to made-up stories of urgently overdue tax payments, bogus contest winnings, or a smooth-talking online suitor, who suddenly needs some gift cards.
- While people aged 25-40 are most likely to be scammed, research shows it's seniors who stand to lose the most, with their median losses more than double the average.

WORLD'S DEEPEST OCTOPUS NAMED 'DUMBO' AFTER DISNEY ELEPHANT CHARACTER

In an interesting discovery, scientists have filmed the world's deepest-sighted octopus at almost 4.3 miles down in the Indian Ocean. Believed to be a new species of Grimpoteuthis, a genus of deep-sea umbrella octopuses, it has been named 'Dumbo octopus', as its fins resemble the ears of a Disney elephant character. Scientists said the animal was 14-17 inches-long, inhabiting at around 6,900 metres deep in the ocean, and they hopped from place to place on the seabed

WORLD TEAM TENNIS PLANS TO ALLOW UP TO 500 FANS TO ITS MATCHES

World Team Tennis (WTT) plans to allow up to 500 spectators at each of its outdoor matches during the season from July 12 to August 2 at a resort in West Virginia. "In accordance with state health guidelines, WTT will allow up to 500 fans (20% capacity) to attend its outdoor matches. Ticket pricing and access points will be announced at a later date," a statement on the official website of WTT, wtt.com read. The likes of 2020 Australian Open champion and World No. 4 Sofia Kenin and US Open champ and 2018 French Open finalist Sloane Stephens will take part in the three-week meet.

All tennis events sanctioned by the ATP, WTA and International Tennis Federation are on hold till at least July due to the Covid-19 crisis

ROGER FEDERER PIPS MESSI TO BECOME WORLD'S HIGHEST-PAID ATHLETE

Swiss marvel and tennis icon Roger Federer has managed to topple the likes of Cristiano Ronaldo and Lionel Messi to become the world's highest-paid athlete. Federer has topped the 2020 Forbes magazine list of highest-paid global athletes for the first time, with massive pre-tax earnings of \$106.3 million.



Indian skipper Virat Kohli is the only Indian to enter the Forbes list of 100 richest athletes in the world

UV robot to zap coronavirus

A shopping mall in Singapore has deployed a newly-developed smart robot to fight the novel coronavirus, not with chemicals but with light.

ITS SPECIALTY

While spraying has become the norm in many places around the world, the robot uses



ultraviolet lamps to disinfect not only surfaces, but tricky-to-reach crevices, and even the air.



SMART ROBOT!

UVC can be harmful to the skin and eyes, which is why the robot, which looks like a bunch of fluorescent lights standing up on a moving base, is tested after the mall's closing time. But it is programmed to turn off its UV lights, if it detects a human in close proximity. Once its route has been fully mapped, the robot is expected to perform its cleaning cycle autonomously, and recharge itself afterwards.

THE COST

Each one costs \$570,000 (\$49,500). Some are being leased to clients for \$53,000 (\$2,121) a month, and some will be given to hospitals and isolation centres

WHAT IS TWITTER FACT-CHECK?

X-PLAINED

WHAT Twitter's fact-check has gathered a storm, after the new fact-checking label was used to mark one of the tweets of the US President Donald Trump as "potentially misleading."

WHY Twitter had recently added a 'Fact-Checking' label to tweets with potentially-misleading or false claims. Twitter CEO Jack Dorsey declared war on what he calls "spreading misinformation online", by adding that the public platform will go after such news across the world.

WHERE

The labels appear below a tweet that seems to carry harmful misinformation or claim. It links to a page curated by the Twitter staff or "external trusted sources" with more information about the claims made in a tweet. Initially, Twitter rolled out the feature with three categories of labels. Misleading information: not yet confirmed to be false or misleading by experts. Disputed claims: credibility of claims contested and Unverified claims: information that is unconfirmed as yet

HOW Twitter officials say they identify tweets using "internal systems" that aim to ensure that the platform is not amplifying the tweets with these labels, and detecting highly-visible content quickly.

She was 13 when she decided to WRITE A BOOK

Teen Author and TEEd Talk Speaker Neeha Gupta Tells Us About Finding Your Passion

Neeha Gupta decided to write a book when she was 13-years-old. By the time she had turned 17, she had already written two. She debuted with 'Different' – a science fiction story in which an alien navigates through complex life on Earth; and followed it up with 'Swapped' in which two high school students, a reserved Rachel and the free-spirited Harleen find their lives intersecting in a crazy twist of fate. The young author based both books on what she knew best... aka her experience as a teenager. She did not let her young age or inexperience from taking on the herculean task of writing. And that's not all, this teen achiever is also a TedEd Speaker, having given a talk on how age is just a number. Excerpts from an interview:

Q: How old were you when you

first decided that you must write a book?

A: I was 13-14 when I became committed to the idea of writing my own novel. 'Swapped' has been the result of my own real-life experiences. As a teenager, when I was submitting college applications, I was unclear about my future aspirations! I was conflicted between societal expectations and my own thoughts, and that phase made me realise the need for a book like this. I do not have any clear ideas for another story just yet, but if inspiration strikes, a new book is always on the cards.

Q: Would you say voracious readers make for better writers?

A: Definitely! As a youngster, I was an avid reader, and used to devour books over breakfast, lunch and dinner. It is only natural for readers to have a better command over the language, their unique style of writing, and a sense of familiarity with story-

telling. In my childhood I have read Nancy Drew, Wonder, Percy Jackson, St Claire's – mainly all the fiction out there.



Q: Please tell us more about your writing process?

A: With 'Swapped', the writing process was rather unconventional. I wrote the first 10,000 words of the book and then took a 6-month gap due to school, writer's block, etc. However, I got back to it and finished the rest of the 45,000 words of the book in a matter of 10 days!

I did have a blueprint sketched out for the story to serve as a base from the very beginning. However, the finer details and key twists and turns of the plot emerged as I wrote.

Q: How did you respond to people who say 'But you are too young to be an author!'

A: This question always brings a smile to my face, as it allows me to share one of my deepest beliefs. I simply respond by saying – if you want to do something badly enough, you find a way to do it. I really do not have an alternative answer.

Grass Jewel

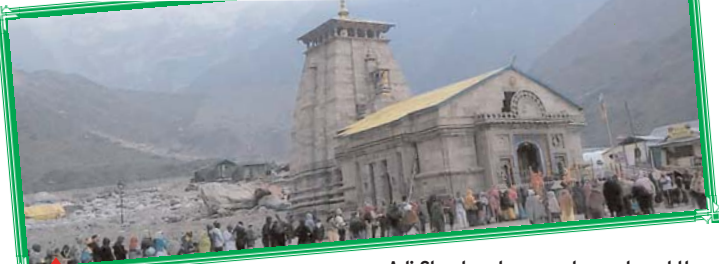
Or Freyeria trochylus is a small butterfly found in India, Africa, United Arab Emirates, Oman, Saudi Arabia, Bulgaria, Greece and southern Asia. It belongs to the Lycaenids or blues

family. The males have brown upper-side while female uppersides are brown in colour. The markings are similar in both, but in females, they are larger and more clearly defined – the yellow crowning on hindwings and the black spots on the tornal area (the tail portion of a butterfly).
